We celebrated another successful and inspiring Science Week at Featherstone.



INTERNATIONAL DEBATE

Last half term, six Year 11 students participated in an online debate against a school in Malaysia.

Having been shortlisted in the first round, earlier on in the year, the Year 11 students: Risha, Ruby, Areena, Salmaan, Hamid and Mahmood were set the challenging task of debating in opposition to a Malaysian school's proposition 'This house believes that Climate change is an inevitable disaster'. Despite the fact that half way through the debate there was a fire drill – our team held their own in an unenviable task, exploring the impact and reaction of climate change in our present time.

The judges were impressed with the outcome of the first ever debate organised by Picture News and Asti (Association of Science and Technology Malaysia) and commended both teams for their contributions in making it an engaging and informative debate, which the Malaysian team won overall.

The students thoroughly enjoyed their first international debate, developing their debating skills, exchanging contacts and making new friends across the miles. It was a unique experience and a wonderful opportunity to exchange ideas with students on the other side of the world.


Hamid came to the UK as a refugee from Afghanistan and shared his educational journey with us. He inspired our students to know that they

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
