






FHS STUDENTS MAKE EXCEPTIONAL PROGRESS

HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE



S. Eliot wrote that "April is the cruellest month" and it is probably one of the most famous

opening lines of any poem written in the English language. It is not an easy sentiment to understand as surely April is the month of brighter mornings and evenings; the blooming of flowers and the optimism that comes from not having to put on several layers just to leave the house.

For Eliot, April is a cruel month because it starts a cycle destined to end in the depths of winter. This is not a cheery observation, but then he was writing just after the First World War and perhaps he tended to see things in a rather bleak way.

I think it is quite different! April is the month where the lighter days suggest how much can be achieved and students at Featherstone are preparing themselves for the inevitable challenge that comes at the end of the school year. For the exam years, this is set out very clearly but for every year there is the need to finish well as that is the best way of making the most of your time at school and, of starting the next year well.

The very best thing about April is that it is not too late from an education perspective and in the context of a school year. Even someone who has perhaps not made the best of the year so far can turn things around with a bit of effort. In fact, one of the very best things about schools is that anyone can change the way they are working or preparing or behaving almost

overnight. Teachers and support staff see the very best in our students and effort is recognised very, very quickly.

Therefore, we all have reason to be optimistic as we return to a term starting in April. There is still time; the days are lighter, and we may even be in for some slightly better weather. I am encouraged as ever by returning to school after a break and seeing the children so full of life and enthusiasm. I was also struck by how well we finished last term with the long list of thank you notices I made in the first staff briefing of the new term. We can all look forward to going from strength to strength. Maybe the great poet would have benefitted from a visit to Featherstone High!

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Dairy Meadow Primary & Nursery School

Our school ethos is summarised in four simple words:

Enjoy! Educate! Embrace! Empower!

Dairy Meadow is a friendly two form entry primary school in Southall. Our aim is for all of our children to 'flourish' and become curious global minded citizens with a love for sport, music and the arts. We underpin our curriculum with our 4Es of 'Enjoy, Educate, Embrace and Empower'. We have a bespoke careers curriculum so our children can see their future selves and ensure that no pathway is blocked due to gender, class, creed or religion.







We have recently had our OFSTED inspection where we have remained a 'Good' school. The report says that "Pupils are looked after, behave well in and out of lessons, achieve highly, engage with the local community and understand the world of work".

Our KS2 SATS results are above borough average – Reading 84% EXS+ (29% GDS), Writing 78% EXS+ (37% GDS),

We have a strong sports offer with our children taking part in borough wide competitions. There are also separate events for our Pupil Premium and SEND children. Year groups also get to work with Brentford FC in the Joy of Movement programme.

Music is also well taken care of with our Year 3s learning the J-Sax and individual tuition in piano, trumpet, saxophone and flute on offer. Our school choir entertained residents of local care homes over Christmas by singing carols. We've worked alongside St Paul's Girls School to compose and perform a piece of music. We also heavily invest in local music and have had a visit from tabla maestro Kuljit Bhamra and the Mozartists.

Our bespoke careers curriculum invites volunteers to speak to children about the world of work so they can connect their learning with future employment. We have had workshops from Brompton Cycles and JumpSec Cyber Security alongside more traditional careers fairs.


























THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF WORDS FESTIVAL 2024

eeva Piratheepan in Year 10 was one of the winners of The Litmus Project, a fiction writing competition run by the University of Cambridge.


