nce again, Featherstone has achieved outstanding A Level and GCSE results. Many staff were in school on results day and shared in the moments when the envelopes were opened, witnessing the delight of the student's achievements and the affirmation of all their hard work.

Sixth Formers worked incredibly hard with 57% of all grades marked A*-B, an incredible 81% of A Levels marked A*-C. BTEC Level 3 students also excelled, with 73% of grades awarded the top Distinction* or Distinction.

GCSE results were equally celebrated with our results placing the school in the top 3% of schools nationally for the progress students make. 23% of all grades were awarded the top 9-7 grades, with 74% of grades at 9-4.

Top student Joel (10 x Grade 9s) said "I'm thrilled, I really didn't expect to achieve this. The school has really supported me and provided all the resources I needed to get these grades".

ReSET PROJECT

en of our Year 9 students have embarked on the workshop phase of the ReSET Project, which is a new school-based preventative mental health intervention for adolescents.

Funded by the Medical Research Council, it is one of seven research projects chosen as part of a £24 million investment into improving the mental health and wellbeing of adolescents in the UK. Huge numbers of our Year 8 and 9 students applied to take part in the programme, and our workshop participants have been selected at random by the researchers at University College London. Each week we are focusing on skills to support emotional wellbeing, emotion perception and interpersonal relationships. Students



have participated enthusiastically thus far and have engaged in thought provoking discussions. We will be running further groups in Spring and Summer so stay tuned for more updates!
