Rumaitha was one of 5 finalists for the Essay Writing Competition, and we are incredibly proud of her efforts. We are looking forward to our re-accreditation this year and demonstrating the attributes of all our World Class Students.

HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Thank you for your s u p p o r t throughout what was a very long and challenging autumn term of 15



weeks. Over the course of last term, we had 83 students and 19 staff test positive for Covid at some stage. In addition, there were 191 students and 13 staff who needed to stay at home to self-isolate. Despite this significant disruption, there were so many highlights to celebrate last term. We managed to successfully host many of our big autumn term events on site including Awards Evening, Open Evening for Year 6 and our Sixth Form Transition Evening for Year 11. These events required a lot of careful planning to ensure Covid risks were minimised and the support of so many staff and of course the trust of you as parents/carers.

After such a difficult couple of years it was great to see some of our extra-curricular offer back up and running. Throughout last term, our Music Department led by Mr Daron were very high profile in the local community with the school choir supporting the Southall Remembrance Sunday Service; our Senior Band played and sang the new Adele song to Bishops and other dignitaries at a national gathering of the Near Neighbours group in Southall and our Xmas Concert featured over 80 students. Further information about accessing the concert is on the front page of this newsletter, try and listen to some of it if you can.

PE Clubs were thriving last term with 23 clubs up and running and most attracting 25-30 students with between 50 and 60 attending girls football. Many thanks to all PE staff for getting these thriving clubs up and running. Ms Horton and Ms Harvey organised an informal Drama showcase which allowed 33 aspiring student actors to perform to the delight of their parents. A new Careers Club started this year led by Mr Webb and called our Y7 Tunnel Club. Employers from a range of sectors involved in the design and construction of railway tunnels came into school and talk about those careers. We pride ourselves on the quality of our careers programme at Featherstone which begins in Year 7 and continues throughout a child's journey at school.

On the 2nd November we received confirmation that we were one of just 8 schools shortlisted for the World Class School of the Year Award. The Awards Ceremony was on the evening of Dec 6th at Oxford University. Whilst we didn't take first place, to be shortlisted Featherstone High School was deemed to meet the following criteria:

- Offer the best education to students in the UK
- Develop the World Class skills, competencies and characteristics which students need to flourish in an emerging global economy
- Give students the confidence to overcome socio-economic barriers to recognise and achieve their potential

The students, led by our former Head Girl, Zarifah, had to put together a video about what makes our school special. Do have a look at this video which is on our website.

I am sure many parents of students in Year 11 and 13 will be very interested and perhaps concerned about how your son or daughter's GCSE/BTEC/A level grade will be decided in the summer. Last term, the Government's stated intention was that they were "determined" that a modified series of exams would go ahead in the summer. However, they are also requiring schools to put in place what they are calling a "Plan B" should it not be possible to schedule public exams. Plan B requires all schools to identify three examination points to be scheduled during the academic year when students should be set examination standard questions on the topics covered up to that point in time. The questions must be unseen and answered under strict examination conditions. Teachers will mark these exams and they will form the basis of a Teacher Assessed Grade (TAG) for 2022 should it be required. In effect we will be preparing students for two possible eventualities - either end of course public examinations or a series of mock exams to support the award of Teacher Assessed Grades. Mr Thacker (Deputy Headteacher, Curriculum) will be writing to parents of Year 11 and Year 13 students in due course to ensure you are kept fully informed about this process.

EVERY SCHOOL DAY COUNTS

Attendance

Make sure your son/daughter arrives on time and attends every day. Every missed day counts!

It is a fact that the greater the attendance the greater the levels of attainment.

Statistics tell us that if your child's attendance is 88%, they have a 3% chance of achieving five 5-9 GCSEs.

Missing one day of school per week equals one year of school missed over the course of five years.

Applications for Leave During Term Time

Only emergencies or exceptional circumstances will be considered.

Holidays or family gatherings will not be authorised.

Fixed penalty notices will be issued by Ealing. In some cases Ealing will prosecute parents.

Applications are to be made via Operoo on the Parent Portal.

Punctuality

School starts at 8.30am/10.30am (depending on your child's timetable). Students need to be in school before these times as the gates will be closed promptly at 8.30am/10.30am.

Students arriving late are asked to got to Gate A, where they will be met by Senior Staff to explain their reason for absence.

The school gates will close at 8.50am/10.50am. After that, access to school is by the main school reception.

All students are expected to arrive on time at school, ready for lessons. Good punctuality at school is essential for students to achieve their full educational potential. It is also vital for students to form good habits for later life. Punctuality records form part of references passed onto employers or higher educational institutes.

We would ask parents to support us in maintaining good punctuality by:

Ensuring that their children get up in plenty of time to be ready and prepared for school.

Ensuring their child has organised their bag and equipment the night before so that this does not delay departure in the morning.

Discussing any issues of lateness to ensure this does not become a habit.

Monitoring their child's attendance record when it is sent home and looking for patterns of lateness.









OUTSTANDING ATTENDANCE = OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT

POOR ATTENDANCE = UNDER ACHIEVEMENT

97% - 100%

Outstanding attendance. No risk of poor attendance impacting on grades

96% - 96.9%

Risk of underachievement, maybe a quarter of a grade per subject. Close monitoring by Form Tutor and referral to Head of Year

At least 34-46 lessons missed.

94% - 95.9%

Risk of underachievement, up to a third of a grade per subject. Head of Year aware and monitoring. Education Welfare Officer (EWO) aware.

At least 46-68 lessons missed.

90%-93.9%

Severe risk of underachievement linked to attendance. Nearly the equivalent of one academic year of Geography or History lessons missed. EWO monitoring closing.

At least 68-114 lessons missed.

Below 90%

Extreme risk of underachievement. Risk of court action. There are 120 hours of guided learning in one GCSE qualification, at this level, the equivalent of a whole GCSE missed. **At least 114 lessons missed.**
