Imperial College London Visited our Sixth Formers to demonstrate how ventilators work. This was particularly interesting due to the pandemic.




All of Year 10 were lucky to experience the magic of Dr Ken Farquhar who conducted inspiring STEM shows and workshops. Dr Ken took our students on a voyage of discovery, investigating how performers make use of many scientific principles in their tricks and stunts.



Professor Malcolm MacCallum from the Heilbronn Institute for Mathematical Research (University of Bristol) and the Maths Dept, (Queen Mary University), spoke to our Year 12 and 13 Physics students on the controversial topic: "was Einstein right?"

Year 10 Physics students also enjoyed a talk from him on black holes.



Our KS3 students had the opportunity to experience the Royal Institution Live where they enjoyed an explosive introduction to the power of science. The show was jam-packed with experiments, explosions and hands-on participation by the students.



The Learn by Design programme, in partnership with HS2, ran a workshop called the EPIC (Extraordinary People Initiating Change) Engineers STEM workshop. This involved 60 students in Year 8. They designed a train station, built a model tunnel and learned about managing a rail network.

HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

At the time of writing, we have just 4 weeks left of this action-packed Spring term and



it seems remarkable that we are just 35 working days from the start of the summer public examinations. Students in Years 11 and 13 are currently sitting the second series of mock examinations in preparation for what we know will be end of year public examinations for all GCSE, A level and BTEC students. A total of 143 Year 11 and 13 students attended our 2 day half term boosters and our usual offer of holiday booster classes will continue in the Easter holiday and through Saturday Workshops. In addition, over 400 students are benefitting from the government funded "Catch Up" tutoring programmes we have arranged across 15 subjects. Engaging in well planned independent revision strategies alongside the revision we are providing at school is vital given the disruption to learning that has taken place. Exam Boards have shared details of topics that will be covered in the public exams and in turn teachers have shared these with students. We are confident that each student genuinely has the capacity to not just 'do themselves justice' in the coming months, but to absolutely shine. We have a wealth of resources on Google Classroom and Firefly to support independent revision, please do encourage your son/daughter to access these.

As you will be very aware one impact of Covid was to significantly reduce our ability to offer Curriculum Enrichment experiences, however we are well on the way to re-establishing this. As featured on the front page. our science department are to be congratulated for arranging another very stimulating and topical Science Week just before half term which included a wealth of external speakers including some well-known celebrity TV scientists. This feedback was from the HS2 Learn by Design Engineering Workshop and typified the feelings of all our external speakers:

"I just wanted to take the opportunity to say a massive thank you to the students, who all behaved wonderfully and were a credit to the school. They engaged and participated very well in the activities and completed the tasks to a very high standard; they were also polite and listened well to myself and my colleagues."

We are planning a Spring Term Music Concert on site on March 31st at 6.15pm and parents are warmly invited to attend. We are also looking further forward to our annual musical which this year, is We Will Rock You!

The current situation in Ukraine has understandably brought sombre feeling amongst us all. Due to her involvement in football, she has worked with many well-known brands such as Nike, Pepsi and even Chelsea Football Club. Iqra caught the eve of Voque who have photographed

and interviewed her on two separate occasions for a double spread feature in their magazine.

LMI Update - Digital
