FAREWELL TO OUR HEADTEACHER

MR GERRY WADWA IS RETIRING AFTER NEARLY 14 YEARS AT FEATHERSTONE HIGH SCHOOL.

r Wadwa came to Featherstone in September 2009, having previously worked in six secondary schools in the London area (including two Deputy Headships and an Interim Headship in a school in challenging circumstances).

During his time at Featherstone, Mr Wadwa has overseen many changes, incredible achievements and great challenges (including delaying his retirement to take us through the pandemic).

We maintained our Outstanding Ofsted designation (followed by regular endorsements of this grade) and achieved World Class School status in 2016 (which has been reaccredited twice). Perhaps the biggest change for Featherstone was receiving government approval to become a Sponsoring Academy. We used this to develop the Grand Union Multi-Academy Trust with Woodlands Primary School and increased our work with our local feeder primary schools.

2018 was a fantastic year for Featherstone and for Mr Wadwa

professionally. During this year, our exceptional performance was honoured by the Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, through the Schools for Success Award. Mr Wadwa also received a personal invitation to Number 10 with 100 selected teachers, committed to giving every child an excellent education.

We have also seen physical changes to our school. As Mr Wadwa joined us, our new sixth form block became fully operational, and was officially opened in the Autumn Term of 2010. He has overseen an upgrade of the LRC, a brand-new library reading room, two new science labs, a climbing wall, a major refurbishment of our main block, and a new dedicated Social Inclusion building (to name a few!).

We have received many awards during Mr Wadwa's time, including: a regular endorsement from the SSAT (Schools, Students and Teacher Network) for educational outcomes – putting us in the top of performance tables for non-selective schools nationally for student attainment, student progress and high levels of performance for students eligible for pupil premium. The school



holds a certificate of recognition from the National Endowment Foundation for challenging disadvantage, Investors in People, Leading Edge 2016, Capita partner status, Institute of Education partner status, Young Enterprise centre of excellence, the National Standard for Enterprise, the Institute of Education's Gold Award for professional development and London Gold Club status. We have also had recognition for award winning lessons from Good Schools Guide.

We see fantastic GCSE, A Level and BTEC Level 3 results, building year on year and putting us regularly in the top 5% of schools for the progress

our students make. Students now regularly get into Oxbridge, top Russell Group Universities, Medical School, overseas placements and competitive apprenticeships.

During Mr Wadwa's Headship, we have been privileged to have had plenty of important visitors. The then Prime Minister and her Education Secretary - Teresa May and Damien Hinds, selected our school to speak to students and see how we do things. Our pupils entertained the King (then Prince Charles) in a multi-faith event. We entertained the Archbishop of Canterbury, local dignitaries and Faith Leaders during a visit to Southall to promote inter-faith dialogue and harmony. We have also welcomed various guest speakers including Sir Steve McQueen, Lord Professor Robert Winston, Mark Ramprakash, Jamie Redknapp and Michael Attenborough.

Students have travelled overseas on trips to Iceland, NYC, Washington DC, Spain, Belgium and France. They have also enjoyed getting involved in whole school events such as fantastic School Musicals including Bugsy Malone and We Will Rock You, the Dance Festival and School Concerts. The school has also developed annual events such as Science Week and the Wonderful World of Words literacy festival. Mr Wadwa enjoys his sport and a highlight was the formation of a Gaelic Football Team at Featherstone. The students travelled to Ireland to take on schools there and tour the City of Dublin. They even made the evening news!

Mr Thacker (Senior Deputy Head) praised Mr Wadwa as "a consummate professional and role model who has led us by his example. Someone whose commitment, sagacity and advice will sorely be missed as sadly the school and Gerry now part ways. All things must come to an end – but his enduring

legacy is to leave an outstanding school that continues to serve our community well".

Mrs Winters (Deputy Head) said: "Thank you for your support, care, guidance and advice as always. Wishing you only the very best (a good rest!) in your new adventure of retirement".

Our Director of Finance, Mr Haider added: "Every child and member of staff really does matter when it comes to Gerry. His door has always been open to everyone during his tenure in which he has immersed himself into the school motto 'Together We Achieve.' Gerry has tirelessly driven standards with his leadership skills coming to the fore getting the school successfully through the pandemic. It is sad to be saying goodbye but we wish Gerry a wonderful, well deserved retirement and the very best for his future endeavours".

Mr Wadwa previously said, "As a school we are passionate about giving our students, many of whom come from deprived backgrounds, the best possible chances and opportunities to excel in their studies and go on to

Thank you to all the students and staff involved.







At FHS we promoted our Anti bullying campaign by allowing all students




and staff the opportunity to take part by wearing odd socks. Odd socks represens how each and every one of us are unique and that we should encourage our differences.



THINK ABOUT AN APPRENTICESHIP

y name is Dilpreet Kaur Bains (I graduated from FHS this Summer) and I am a Level 4 Junior Management Consultant Apprentice at IBM. Instead of going to university I am completing a 2-year apprenticeship which will provide me with a qualification equivalent to the first year of university. Simultaneously, I work as a ServiceNow Developer and Consultant at IBM, where I am aiming to achieve a ServiceNow Certified System Administrator Certification whilst working on client projects.

From 16 years old I knew I didn't want to attend university, where I would walk away with a minimum of £30,000 debt despite having a degree under my belt. Studies show that the number of graduates has increased but the number of graduate schemes has not, thus why would I want to put myself in a position where I have accumulated a hefty loan through higher education yet struggle when job hunting. Therefore, it was my mission to kickstart my early professional career whilst earning and learning, therefore an apprenticeship would enable me to do so.

There are various types of apprenticeships, ranging from Level 2 to Level 7 and you



should apply for the level of education you are interested in achieving and your desired industry/role. I would highly encourage students to research as much as possible about the role they are applying for, to determine if they are suitable for the role as well as the role being a good fit for them. After all, an apprenticeship isn't an easier route, if not it can be more challenging because you are working full-time and studying part-time. Hence, it is paramount that you enjoy your job role, to ensure you can pass your apprenticeship/qualifications successfully.

The support I was given within FHS were from the Business Department, including Ms Pal and Mrs Sharma as well as the Sixth Form Leadership Team, such as

Mr Webb. However, it is crucial that you are proactively looking for vacancies and are self-motivated. Also, I was fortunate enough to have made amazing connections through attending many work experiences, events, and careers fairs. Thus, I benefitted from being notified of vacancies through platforms such as LinkedIn as the connections I made posted when their employers were hiring.

I am hosting an apprenticeship dropin session from 1:30pm – 2:15pm every Week B Friday in the Sixth Form Atrium, where you can pop by and ask any questions on the application and selection process.




STEP BACK IN TIME

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OXFORD UNIVERSITY: PHYSICS & MATHS DAY

STUDENT REPORTS:

Ishita Mankoo: 'This prestigious opportunity from Oxford provided us with an insightful experience of what physics and material physics courses are like at Oxford University. Learning about new, interesting concepts such as superconductors and calculating the age of the universe was especially gripping. Additionally, the hands-on investigations and demonstrations knowledge extended our within particular topics such as strain and stress of materials. Talking to physics students studying at Oxford University also gave us genuine anecdotes of daily life as a student there. It was a truly enthralling experience.'

Gurdit Singh: 'The Oxford Physics and Material Science workshop was excellent as it enlightened me on the two courses and what they entailed. The workshops were very engaging and fun, blended in with a learning aspect. My favourite workshop was the astrophysics one where spectroscopy was vev well explained although it was university level content. All in all, the workshops were very interactive and being in Oxford was a significant positive as we explored the area from different department to a tour of Mansfield College. The staff were very friendly and demystified Oxford stereotypes which usually deterred potential applicants.'



STEM PROGRAMME AT BRUNEL UNIVERSITY

ear 9 students, Nicole Dosanjh and Srijay Sivasothinathan have been attending Brunel Engineering masterclasses on Saturdays. Here are their reports:

Nicole Dosanjh 'We learnt about space and used tin foil, tin boxes and crisp packets to create something that would successfully block the phone's communication signals. This experiment represented how scientists are coming up with new ways to protect space crafts from radioactive material in space. For the second half of the lesson we had to design a moonbase taking into consideration basic human needs and what you would need to do to make sure they can survive in space.


We have learnt how to use some equipment in the lab such as an oscilloscope, which graphically displays varying electronic voltages. We also learnt about CAD (Computer-Aided Design) and were shown how to use the Autodesk software. This software is mainly used to create pieces of work that can later be printed out on a 3D printer when completed.'

Sivasothinathan: 'At programme students from schools in West-London are participating in a 6-week series of activities every Saturday.

bv Student They are hosted Ambassadors and professors from the

University in the Wilfred Brown building. They participate in activities such as using a 3d-printer to model and create various objects which they will receive at the end of the 6-weeks. These students also get to have access to labs where they can see robots and Al created by the University and using apparatus such as multi-meters and Oscillators. You can use these to measure sound waves and frequencies and test to see if the factor of age affects the frequency in which you can hear it.STEM subjects teach you important transferable skills that include critical thinking, problem solving and teamwork. These skills can be applied to different professions and throughout your life. Some of the skills you will learn include: Solving real problems with innovative and creative solutions."
