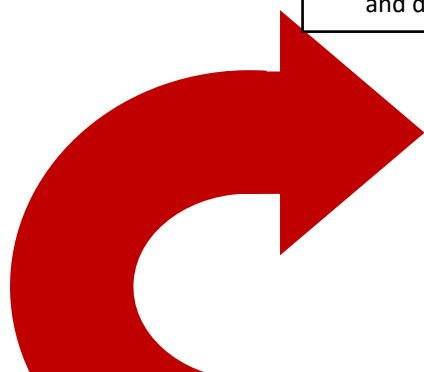




- Read and understand key ideas and concepts in prose, poetry and drama.

Summer Term

Exploration of human emotions: unseen poetry

- Analyse unseen poetry through reciprocal reading strategies: students to predict, question, clarify and summarise unseen poetry.
- Develop empathy skills through the exploration of themes such as prejudice
- Analyse the language and structure within poetry.
- To identify and discuss the poets' agendas.



Spring Term



Romeo and Juliet by William Shakespeare

- Introduction to the tragedy genre and Aristotelian conventions of tragedy.
- Analysis of language devices such as oxymoron, imagery and irony with consideration of the playwright's agenda.
- Analysis of structural features including character development.
- Making connections to the wider social and historical context.
- Developing oracy skills through class presentations.

Autumn Term

Every Line of You by Naomi Gibson

- Introduction to the sci-fi genre.
- Analyse the writer's use of structure: flashbacks, flashforwards and turning points.
- Analysis of language with consideration of the writer's agenda.
- Making connections to wider social issues such as A.I and power & privilege.
- Evaluating ideas through discussions and debates on topics such as technology.
- Developing writing skills to match audience, purpose and form.



Year 8 Summer Term



A Midsummer Night's Dream

- Understanding the use of minor characters to build the comedy genre.
- Exploring dramatic tension through the development of plot and characters.
- Understanding 'counterargument' and 'point of view'.
- Examining the relationship between characters through methods such as similes, metaphors and semantic field.
