during WW2? There were some incredible experiences to enhance this learning. Year 4 visited the remains of the only Roman amphitheatre in London – underneath the Guildhall, and Year 6 had some thought-provoking discussions with Simon from the National Holocaust Centre and Museum comparing evacuees from London to those who experienced the Kindertransport. Year 5 were lucky enough to visit the National Portrait Gallery to take part in a drawing workshop. Year 3 thoroughly enjoyed their DT unit where they designed and made the most beautiful photo frames. They even got to use saws to cut their own wood!
