

and how she creates the characters and settings for her stories.



Lots of staff members joined in the fun by dressing up as characters from books.



Our team will be representing the New York Jets, whereas other schools will be competing for the Chicago Bears, in what is the first NFL girls' flag competition in the UK!



If you have more than one child, you can access Class Charts information about your children from a single, centralised parent account.

Class Charts for parents can be accessed via our website, or through iOS and Android apps.

You will receive a parent code from Class Charts which will look like the



example code shown on the left. This code is used to set up your Class Charts parent account. <u>Please refer to this guide</u> for parents for further help on how to set up your account and use the app.

Your child will be able to access Class Charts via a student app. This information will be shared with students in school.
